

Arrangement in the Final Round

The YICGG2024 Committee will randomly divide all the contestants into World Teams. World Teams need to carry out research on the final theme of YICGG2024 which will be announced at the opening ceremony, and each team should submit a written project within the limited time and deliver a presentation.

During the Final Round, contestants will participate in a series of activities centered around the final theme, including:

1. Ice Breaking:

The Ice Breaking session is designed to gently facilitate communication and acquaintance among contestants. Through a series of engaging and interactive activities, including games and collaborative challenges, we aim to foster a warm and inviting atmosphere where barriers naturally dissolve. This welcoming environment encourages contestants to connect and share, setting the stage for a fruitful and enjoyable experience.

2. Ignite Talk

It is an optional part for the contestants. Applicants are required to submit their Talk outlines (150-200 words) focused on their chosen topics. Around 20 applicants will be selected by the judges to share their

insights in the Ignite Talk. The most impressive participant will be honored with the individual award “The Ignite Talk King/Queen (ITK/ITQ)”.

3. World Café

It is a form of brainstorming. The World Teams engage in round-table discussions under the guidance of judges, focusing on their proposals developed according to the final theme. Each discussion lasts 15-20 minutes. When the time is up, the World Teams rotate to the next table, where another judge leads the discussion, and so on, allowing contestants to interact with all the judges. The judges and contestants continuously exchange their ideas, igniting sparks of thought.

4. We Youth Common Agenda (WYCA)

“We Youth Common Agenda” aims to nourish the common goals of the youth who share a passion for global governance. The committee will prepare a draft of the WYCA according to preliminary proposals. During the final round, we will conduct a round of idea collection from the World Teams through roundtable discussions. The final version of the WYCA will then be completed, drawing on the outcomes of these discussions, and will be announced at the Closing Ceremony.

5. Field Work

“Field Work” offers contestants a unique opportunity to engage in on-site research, immersing themselves in locales imbued with distinctive

local characteristics. It is recommended to document the Field Work through the use of photos, videos, or audio recordings, capturing the essence of the experience firsthand and deepening your understanding of local conditions and traditions. These records serve as invaluable resources for the final presentation.

6. Culture Night

Culture Night serves as a platform for contestants to engage in cross-cultural interaction. During this event, participants can showcase their preferred modes of expression, such as singing, dancing or speaking. Contestants hailing from diverse regions and countries converge to enhance their comprehension and communication through varied forms of performance and interaction.

7. Final Presentation

The session provides the contestants with the opportunity to showcase their achievements. Each World Team is required to select a minimum of 2 representatives to deliver a 10-minute PowerPoint presentation, allowing 7 minutes for presentation and 3 minutes for Q&A. Multimedia methods are encouraged. Following the presentations and proposals, judges will evaluate and score each team's performance. The team achieving the highest score will be recognized with the "Most Valuable Project (MVP)".
